I am in receipt of the inspection notice dated June 17, 2024, it was received on June 19, 2024, and per the instructions, I am providing a written response. I have collaborated with my operator Matt Gillock to provide these responses.

The plant started having issues around the beginning of June. Matt reached out to me to inform me of the situation and indicated that he would be reaching out to Kevin Stark at IDEM as well. On June 18<sup>th</sup>, Matt met with Pete Crowl from the Indiana Alliance and they performed some additional testing. Those tests indicated that our air system in the aeriation tank could be the source of the problem. On the 19<sup>th</sup> my staff had a portion of the aeration system removed to find the diffusers to be worn and clogged. A small percentage were cleaned on that day and the remaining cleaned on the following day. New diffusers were ordered for replacement on June 20<sup>th</sup>. In addition, we had approximately 4,000 gallons of healthy bugs brought in from Columbus on June 19<sup>th</sup> as well.

As I understood, Kevin indicated to Matt that he wanted testing performed 5 days a week until levels were brought back within normal range. In speaking with Matt, the final ammonia levels were 38.8 on Thursday June 20<sup>th</sup>, dropped to 29.4 on Friday and were at 16.7 on Saturday. All these figures correlate with our increasing DO numbers during the same period of time, which are directly related to the increased air into the aeriation tank. The working theory is that while temperatures are lower during the winter and spring months, the lack of oxygen had less of an effect on the bugs in the plant. As temperatures climbed at the end of May and beginning of June, the heat caused the bugs to be stressed and begin to die.

The color in the tanks have improved and the plant seems to be getting back to normal. The new diffusers will be installed when they are received, but operations are continuing to improve.
